



Online Database of the Month: Student Research Center

Student Research Center (SRC) is an electronic database that is designed for students in grades 6 to 12. Students can link to primary source documents, full-text magazine and newspaper articles, biographies, radio and television transcripts, photographs, maps and much more.

The database is easy to use and delivers relevant information with just a few keystrokes.

At the basic search screen, type in the topic you are researching. The SRC database, which is updated daily, searches for your topic among thousands of articles from magazines, newspapers and other sources. The screen allows you to select the specific source from which you want to receive your results.

Near the top of each page are helpful links to the American Heritage Dictionary and the Columbia Encyclopedia that allow the user to look up definitions or short introductions to unfamiliar concepts they encounter in the articles.

Since the SRC is geared for students in grades 6 to 12 with a wide range of reading and comprehension levels, it offers the capability of limiting the results by Lexile Reading Level. In the "Limit Your Results" box, you can specify the grade level in which to receive your results. This handy feature assists middle school researchers by filtering out articles that are written for older high school students.

As an example, a search on the debate about evolution and intelligent

design conducted with no Lexile Reading Level limit specified yielded over 1,600 results. The same search with a grade 6 to 8 limit provided 49 results, and a grade 9 to 12 limit generated 181 results. While some articles are not evaluated using the Lexile Reading Level scale, using this feature will narrow the number of results for any search.

To begin your search on the Student Research Center, use the library's catalog terminals or your home computer to visit the HSPLS home page at <http://www.librarieshawaii.org>, click on the "Catalogs" tab and "E-Databases" link, and then scroll down to select the "Student (Gr. 6-12) Research Center." You will need your library card and PIN to access the database from outside the library.

The Student Research Center is provided by Library Services and Technology Act funding, which is administered by the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services.

Wailuku Library Receives \$3,500 Grant

Kindle Now Compatible with OverDrive eBooks

Attention all Kindle users! On September 21, Amazon and OverDrive, the Hawaii State Public Library System's (HSPLS) primary provider of eBooks, announced that the popular ebook reader Kindle is now compatible with the system's eBook collection. Library patrons with Kindle eBook readers can now access and download from HSPLS' growing collection of electronic materials.

Patrons with eBook readers can browse HSPLS' eBook collection through the library website www.librarieshawaii.org by clicking on EBooks, Audio-books and Music, then accessing <http://hawaii.lib.overdrive.com>. By clicking on the "Kindle Now Available" button, users can access thousands of eBook titles for all ages on a wide variety of topics including fiction, non-fiction, health, fitness, business, religion, cooking, self-improvement, and biographies. Through the convenience of remote access, library patrons with a valid library card may borrow up to ten eBooks free of charge for up to three weeks without traveling to the library or incurring overdue charges.

EBooks are the fastest growing segment of HSPLS' total circulation. With Kindle compatibility, circulation is expected to rise by more than 30% this year, to over 100,000.



Enjoy Children and Teen Programs this Fall

Celebration of Teen Read Week (October 16-22), **Audra Furuichi**, co-creator of the web-comic "Nemu Nemu," and **Jon J. Murakami**, creator of the "Gordon Rider" comic book, will be featured artists at selected public libraries during the month of October. Teen Read Week is an annual literacy initiative created by the American Library Association for teens, their parents, librarians, and others.

In addition, libraries statewide will host free programs focusing on this year's theme – "Picture It @ your library" – which encourages teens to read graphic novels and other illustrated materials, seek out creative books or imagine the world through literature, just for the fun of it.



Splat is determined to be the scariest cat in his class. Will he win the award?





Chun has distinguished himself both within HSPLS and throughout the broader library community in Hawaii. As Section Head, Chun actively encourages personnel

training, professional development and ongoing dialogue among his staff members. He is a creative thinker, who has spearheaded the Patent and Trademark Depository Library Program, has undertaken the retroactive inventory of his Section's collection, and has implemented and supervised the Passport Acceptance Facility at the Hawaii State Library which, as an enhanced service, has generated nearly \$60,000 for the HSPLS Special Fund this year alone.

Chun, an 18-year HSPLS employee, has also served Hawaii's library community as a Board Member of the UH Library and Information Science Alumni Group, a member of the ALA Government Documents Round Table, and as Vice President and now President of the Hawaii Library Association.

As HSPLS Employee of the Year, Chun will be honored at the Governor's Award Ceremony on October 14 at 2:30 p.m. in the State Capitol Auditorium.

Fina Rivera, Janitor II, Ewa Beach Public and School Library, is the 2011 Sustained Superior Performance Award winner.

Rivera has been a valued and respected member of the Ewa Beach Library staff for more than 30 years, and has brightened countless days for her fellow staff members with her cheery greetings and disposition. In addition to her regular work responsibilities, Rivera is always ready to pitch in to help make the library a happier place, and is always willing to assume additional projects, such as caring for the plants in the library's atrium or decorating the library for every major holiday. Celebrate Filipino-American History Month

The Hawaii State Library will celebrate Filipino-American History Month 2011 by hosting "Filipino Komiks" photo and art exhibit, and free Saturday programs during October.

"Filipino Komiks," presented by the Filipino-American Historical Society of Hawaii, will be available for viewing in the First Floor Reading Room of the Library from October 1-29 during regular library hours. The exhibit explores how Filipinos express themselves through comics and the comics phenomena that captivates their society.

An Opening Ceremony to commemorate Filipino-American History month will be conducted on Oct. 1 from 1 p.m.-3 p.m. in the Courtyard. The ceremony will feature a welcome address by Philippine Consul Paul Cortes, entertainment by the Philippine Consulate Singers, a dance performance by the Tekniqlingz Dance Crew, and an introduction to "Filipino Komiks."
