



In 1944, African American sailors at Port Chicago were under pressure to load bombs faster onto waiting ships, until finally a horrific explosion killed hundreds. 50 men refused to work under such unsafe conditions and were charged with mutiny. Told through interviews, court records, and other primary sources. Gr. 5-8

Stone, Tanya Lee. Courage Has No Color: The True Story of the Triple Nickles, America's First Black Paratroopers. Chronicles the courage and persistence of the Triple Nickles, the African Americans who pushed through military barriers to become the first black paratroopers. Their efforts, the eventual recognition of the 555th Parachute Infantry Battalion, and the broader issues of segregation during the war period are illustrated with a collection of interviews, letters, and photos.
