GREETINGS FROM LBPD-HONOLULU

Greetings with much aloha from your Hawaii LBPD staff. It has been guite a while since our last newsletter so there is some catching-up to do. First, you should know that we have added a new staff member in our Public Services Section. Ava Romualdo comes to us with experience in several different libraries in Wisconsin. However, much of her family hails from Kaneohe, so she feels right at home at LBPD. Over the past months the library has taken on many diverse efforts to increase reading options and opportunities, to build up and strengthen community ties, and to reach out and educate members of the public about reading accessibility for those who may have visual or print disabilities. Here at the library we celebrated the bicentennial of braille in January 2024 and had so much fun that we followed up with another celebration the last Friday of January 2025. It looks like that will be an annual tradition for our library community. The book club has taken off on the first Saturday of every month and we're having a great time gathering in person at LBPD for those sessions. With the most generous contributions we've received from individuals and consumer groups alike we have embarked on a significant upgrade for the Hawaii Radio Reading Service to include the purchase of new radios, improved links between the library and our broadcasting partner at Hawaii Public Radio, and hopefully soon a companion streaming service for those preferring to hear the broadcast online. We are also very proud to let you know that we have started to record books in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i for the very first time in the history of the library. Once again, our incredible volunteers, both veterans and new comers are a central part of all that we do. Finally, I want to share with you some thoughts about library services in the coming months. Not a day goes by when an LBPD patron doesn't mention to me a question or concern about possible impacts to library services in these uncertain times. Please know that as a branch within

the Hawai'i State Public Library System we remain committed as a state entity to providing service to you. Similarly, as a part of the Library of Congress, the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled anticipates no reductions in access to the materials and services you enjoy. HAWAI'I LBPD UPDATE

- Summer reading challenge: It's almost that time of year again for the annual Summer Reading Challenge for all readers, keiki to kupuna. This year's theme will be "E Heluhelu Kakōu - Mele," so plenty of opportunities to enjoy music and song. Are you interested in being part of a kanikapila? Let us know so we can plan for an event here at the library. The Summer Reading grand prize drawing is once again tickets on Alaska Airlines.
- Computer classes scheduled: The next round of basic, introduction to computer classes will begin on Friday, May 2 at 11:00 am and will run for four consecutive weeks on Friday. These classes are designed to address basic information like discussing what a computer is, using applications, and how to use the internet safely. We anticipate some additional presentations as well along with these computer classes. For example, on May 2, at 12:30 pm after the computer class there will be a presentation by local author and library user Deborah Joyce on how to protect yourself against identity theft. On May 2, at 1:30 pm T-Mobile will present information addressing general cyber security considerations, especially for those with disabilities. Later in May there will also be a session dedicated to use of smart phones. Call the library at 808-733-8444 if you would like to participate in any of these sessions.
- Book club: The monthly thematic book club continues the first Saturday of each month at 2:00 pm at the library. Each month a theme is selected for the next book club meeting. Readers are free to choose their own book that fits within that theme. The ensuing discussions are fascinating and

entertaining, and the club is a great way to catch up with friends and get up to date on the latest happenings. Some people show up early and bring a sack lunch accompanied by good conversation. The theme for the May book club is "Autobiographies." Call the library for more information!

- Radio Reading Service: The library is working on multiple fronts to update and upgrade the Radio Reading Service. New radios have arrived and are being configured for particular geographic locations around the state, an effort in cooperation with Hawai'i Public Radio. We're also working on some additions to programming lineups to include a special weekly segment hosted by Kyle Laconsay called "Inner Vision," a talk show format with community members about a variety of current topics. Program will be aired on Wednesdays at 11:30 am andSaturday at 3:00 pm. - Braille Challenge: In February for the first time Hawai'i participated in the Braille Institute's Braille Challenge in an organized regional competition. Represented by six DoE students, coached by their TVI's, and hosted by LBPD these school-age braille students represented our state and made us all very proud!

NEW AND SEASONAL READS – MULTIPLE FORMATS

The following are some recently added books to the NLS collection that incorporate music, poetry, and related themes that might be fun for you as we get ready for the Summer Reading Challenge:

- 125 songs for group singing [braille] BRM01014 Lyrics for popular songs for group singing published in 1958.
- Beauty is a Verb [braille]: the new poetry of disability -BR 24267 - Chosen by the American Library Association as a 2012 Notable Book in Poetry. Beauty is a Verb is a ground-breaking anthology of disability poetry, essays on disability, and writings on the poetics of both.
- The Great Composers [braille]: biographies in words and music / transcribed in English braille - BRM34717 – In two volumes including v. 1. Franz Liszt -- Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart -- Franz Schubert -- Ludwig van Beethoven -- Felix Mendelssohn -- Joseph Haydn. v. 2. Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky -- Johann Sebastian Bach --Frederic Chopin -- Johannes Brahms -- Robert Schumann -- Claude Debussy.
- The Magic Strings of Frankie Presto/Mitch Albom. [braille] BR 21324 Music narrates the life of Frankie Presto, from his time in Spain after the Civil War, where he was raised by a blind music teacher, to his death in

America. Frankie immigrates to America with only a sixstringed guitar. As he plies his craft, he realizes its effect on people.

- Julie Andrews' Treasury for all Seasons: poems and songs to celebrate the year [braille] - BR 19702 -Collection of poems and songs that celebrate different holidays and special moments throughout the year. Features works by Andrews, Sandra Cisneros, Emily Dickinson, Dr. Seuss, Jack Prelutsky, John Updike, and others. For grades 2-4 and older readers.
- Dreams the Many Lives of Fleetwood Mac [sound recording] DB 125290 An illuminating deep-dive into everything Fleetwood Mac-the songs, the rivalries, the successes, and the failures-Dreams evokes the band's entire musical catalog as well as the complex human drama at the heart of the Fleetwood Mac story.
- Talkin' Greenwich Village [sound recording]: the heady rise and slow fall of America's bohemian music capita -DB 124449 - The definitive history of the rise and heyday of the revolutionary Greenwich Village music scene, based on new research and first-hand interviews with many of its legendary performers.
- Bus fare to Kentucky [sound recording]: the autobiography of Skeeter Davis DBC31213 From a childhood of poverty and drama, Mary Francis Penick became Skeeter Davis and the first female country artist to have a number one hit on the pop music charts (strong language).
- A Few Words In Defense Of Our Country [sound recording]: the biography of Randy Newman DB 126286 The definitive biography of songwriter Randy Newman, told with his full cooperation, by acclaimed biographer and longtime Los Angeles Times music critic, Robert Hilburn. Randy Newman is widely hailed as one of America's all-time greatest songwriters, equally skilled in the sophisticated melodies and lyrics of the Gershwin-

Porter era and the cultural commentary of his own generation, with Bob Dylan and Paul Simon among his most ardent admirers.

- Blues In Stereo [sound recording]: the early works of Langston Hughes, 1921-1927 DB 126089 Harlem Renaissance poet Langston Hughes was most well-known for his poems, novels, and plays that highlight Black American life in post-slavery America.
- Every Valley [sound recording]: the desperate lives and troubled times that made Handel's Messiah DB 126500 The epic, dramatic story of the 18th century men and women behind the making of Handel's Messiah, one of the world's most beloved works of classical music, from a New York Times bestselling historian and National Book Critics Circle Award finalist.
- J Show time! [juvenile braille]: music, dance, and drama activities for kids - BRG03408 - Introduces the concepts of music, dance, and acting, suggesting how to create a musical production through games and roleplaying, and describing all aspects of a show from auditions to curtain call. Grades 4-7.
- **J Show the world**! [juvenile sound recording] DB 125785 From painting, music, and slam poetry, to engineering, protesting, and photography, a young narrator journeys through her neighborhood, encouraging readers to explore all the many ways they can express themselves. Grades K-2.
- J Upstaged [juvenile sound recording] DB 126272 -Painfully shy seventh-grader Shira Gordon is cast in a small role in The Music Man and also as understudy for the lead, played by diva Monica Manley, who becomes the victim of a prankster. Grades 2-4.
