Aloha Kākou Dear Readers,

As we transition into the fall season it is easy to remember traditions that go along with this time of the year. People gathering resources, considering their long range plans for the coming year - just three months away now, assessing accomplishments over the past seasons, and perhaps renewing a focus on short term preparedness. LBPD has been doing all of these things. Over the past few months we've joined others in the community marking the 35th anniversary of the Americans With Disabilities Act, responded to a tsunami threat, and participated in the annual statewide Summer Reading Challenge along with others throughout the islands. Moving into the fall we will continue to be alert for seasonal and natural circumstances that could present a hazard to our readers, and we will use our new ability to broadcast emergency management public information

broadcasts over the radio reading service to keep you informed. We will also be taking the time to encourage readers to "read freely," especially during the month of October with the "Free Readers Read Freely" program. We hope you can join us in selecting new and different materials that might offer you a new perspective throughout the month and continuing on into the new year. Through it all, please know your LBPD staff is here to support you and your information needs, and that we appreciate all the support and care you show toward each of us on a daily basis. HAWAI'I LBPD UPDATE

- Summer Reading Challenge 2025: You should know that for this year's challenge LBPD patrons read 5,199 books, the third highest total for any library across the entire state! That's an amazing statistic for a library with a relatively small patron base.
- LBPD Book Club: The monthly meetings continue on O'ahu the first Saturday of every month. We would love to get book clubs started on the neighbor islands. If you live on a neighbor island and are interested, please get ahold of us at LBPD.
- Dungeons & Dragons: The D&D pilot program continues at LBPD and participants are having a great time. Each event is limited to a single day, so there is no concern about missing out on a previous event. The group is taking October off, but they will pick back up in November. Give the library a call for more information.
- 'Ōlelo Hawai'i Book Narrators Needed: The library is moving ahead with efforts to start recording books in Hawaiian and other Pacific languages. If you know of anyone that might be a good candidate to help us in this important effort please get in contact with us at the library.
- Public Outreach Events: LBPD staff is participating in the Young at Heart Expo at the Blaisdell Center on September 26 and 27,

and at the Active Senior Expo at the Convention Center on November 14 and 15. If you have suggestions for outreach or guest speaking opportunities for LBPD staff, please let us know and we will follow up with you. We need help in getting the word out about our library services.

- Halloween Kanikapila: We had so much fun in June during the Summer Reading Kanikapila at the library that we are scheduling another musical jam session at the library. Bring your musical talents, or just your enjoyment of music, to the library on Friday, October 31 at 12:00 pm for a fun, spooktacular, musical event. Costumes are allowed and encouraged for the day. The library will provide light refreshments.
- Braille Events: Keep your calendars open for Friday, January 30, 2026 for the Louis Braille Birthday Party at LBPD. That will also serve as the kickoff for the Braille Challenge 2026 season for students learning braille.
- Digital Literacy: After a break over the summer and into the fall LBPD is looking forward to welcoming back computer classes and individual learning opportunities with digital navigators in 2026. These sessions are made possible through special funding that the entire library system across the state has received, and the LBPD opportunities will be tailored to the needs as expressed by our library patrons. NEWS FROM NLS AND THE NETWORK

 BARD and Open Forums: NLS continues to host open forums and to provide information on tips and best practices for using NLS resources. - New Digital Talking Book Machine: The DA-2 allotment for Hawai'i is in shipping now and will likely arrive in October. If you enjoy using your digital talking book machine, but also want the ability to download from BARD directly to your machine, then the DA-2 may be for you. The current model talking book machines will continue in use and are perfectly fine for readers who enjoy getting books and magazines on cartridge without the additional download feature.

- Kindle Fire Operating System Update for BARD: The operating system for Kindle Fire devices is being updated to be more fully integrated with the BARD app and will include fixes to known bugs. The update is available through the Amazon Appstore.
